








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Academics

DEGREES & PROGRAMS

Three-Year JD

The Juris Doctor degree, the basic U.S. law degree, is held by the vast majority of practicing U.S. lawyers, as well as businesspeople, policy makers, academics and other professionals.

Advanced Standing Two-Year JD for Internationally Trained Lawyers

This innovative program is intended for students who already hold a law degree from a jurisdiction outside the United States and who would like to earn a Juris Doctor degree and seek admission to the New York State Bar.

3+3 Accelerated BA-JD

The School of Law recognizes that qualified undergraduate students are ready and able to complete their undergraduate education and their law degree in less time than the seven years of study typically required. Students can accelerate their course of study by completing their BA and JD in just six years of full-time study.

Dual Degrees

Dual degree programs give you a career advantage and reduce the total time required to earn two degrees by up to a year. Many of our students pursue both the JD degree and a master's degree simultaneously.



LLM

Students who already have a first degree in law may pursue a Master of Laws or LLM degree. Our three LLM programs provide highly specialized courses of study designed to match a student's intellectual interests and advance their career to the next level.

Professor; Vice Dean for Academic Affairs

Background:

Professor Christine P. Bartholomew teaches in the areas of evidence, antitrust and civil procedure. Her scholarship focuses on the interplay of these topics, particularly in complex litigation. She is a recipient of the SUNY Chancellor's Award for Excellence in Teaching and is a six-time winner of the law school's teaching award, the Faculty Award.

Background:

Born and raised in Puerto Rico, Professor Luis E. Chiesa is a highly regarded scholar in criminal law and social justice. He also leads the law school's diversity, equity and inclusion initiatives. His scholarly interests focus on substantive criminal law, criminal procedure, comparative law and animal cruelty law.

Background:

Professor Angelyn McDuff brings several years of practice to her classroom, including in compliance and regulatory analysis and immigration law. She previously worked as a staff attorney at Journey's End Refugee Services, on Buffalo's West Side. She has taught courses in international advocacy and has coached the law school's team in the Jessup International Moot Court Competition.

Our Kent Research Scholars

UB School of Law's James Kent Faculty Research Scholar Program provides an opportunity for students with excellent academic credentials to serve as research assistants (RAs) for members of the law school faculty.

Many law students find that serving as a faculty RA is among the most valuable experiences of their law school career. These paid positions enable students to explore interesting and important topics under the guidance of law faculty working on the frontiers of legal scholarship and law reform. RAs develop subject matter expertise and skills in legal research and writing.

Moreover, faculty who work with an RA often serve as mentors and provide support and guidance as their RA prepares to enter law practice. Finally, the work schedule for RAs is tied to the academic calendar, so it is often more flexible than most other work options available to law students.





Throughout law school, **Maura Kutnyak-Smalley '23** (she/her) worked as a research assistant to Professor Heather Abraham, researching how the federal government has contributed to entrenched housing segregation. Her research involved:

- Exploring the power and influence of federal spending over local housing patterns.
- » Building a network of fair-housing leaders to facilitate communication.
- » Researching the effects and efficacy of executive orders.

"The informal conversations where Professor Abraham shared her knowledge of, vision for and passion about fair housing were some of the most meaningful aspects of our work. 

Clinics within clinics

- » Recognizing access to justice needs as they occur, our clinics often take on targeted projects to benefit our community and provide students broader exposure.

- » Our Community Engagement Legal Clinic helps students and their families in school suspension cases where students have been subjected to systemic inequities. This clinic will also undertake unemployment benefit work, thanks to new funding from the New York State Legislature.

Advocacy Institute

Our Advocacy Institute helps students cultivate the skills, discipline and ethics necessary to become creative and principled litigators. In our popular trial technique classes, students prepare and try a civil or criminal case under the tutelage of highly experienced trial lawyers and judges. Students can test those skills against other law schools in nationwide scrimmages and competitions through our trial advocacy and competitions.

The art of appellate advocacy is taught in an Introduction to Appellate Advocacy class, which includes participation in our intramural Charles S. Desmond Moot Court Competition. Based on that experience, students are selected to represent the law school on teams that participate in prestigious national appellate moot court competitions.

Future practitioners in the growing field of alternative dispute resolution can hone their advocacy skills by taking part in our intramural Representation in Mediation Competition. Select students represent our law school in national and international mediation, negotiation and arbitration competitions.

UB School of Law hosts two national competitions: the Buffalo Niagara Mock Trial Competition, one of the largest in the nation, and the Herbert Wechsler National Criminal Moot Court Competition.



Practicums

These four-credit experiential courses are based around hands-on fieldwork assisting and observing practicing attorneys. They explore the related subject area in depth and work on other skills (such as interviewing and counseling clients, access to justice, and writing) through weekly classroom work. Practicums are taught by a team consisting of a full-time professor and experienced practicing attorneys. Students have a chance to observe and reflect on the process of becoming an attorney.

Practicum in Sports Law

Students enrolled in our Practicum in Sports Law tackle topics in the cutting-edge area of sports law, including name, image and likeness deals, player injury and concussion protocols, as well as the local Buffalo Bills stadium construction project. Externships

Law students earn academic credit in a variety of placements in the judiciary, government and non-profit organizations. Students learn from practice at their placements, as well as a seminar focused on practice skills, ethics and professional identity formation. Most externships are in Western New York, including Rochester, with select offerings in New York City and Washington, D.C.

Pro bono scholars

Students must perform 50 hours of pro bono legal service before they're admitted to the New York State bar. Our highly competitive Pro Bono Scholars Program gives select third-year law students the opportunity to take the New York State Bar Exam in February before they graduate. They then work full time in a pro bono placement during their final semester of law school, exploring access to justice issues while developing their lawyering skills and fulfilling their service requirement. Students may also accrue pro bono hours through credit-bearing clinics and externships, volunteer work with legal services agencies or at court help desks, summer legal service fellowships, and placements as judicial law clerks or at government law offices.

New York City Program in Finance and Law

Let Manhattan be your classroom! Our New York City Program in Finance and Law enables select students to spend a semester at the heart of the high-stakes world of corporate finance. Through the program's innovative curriculum, students learn law and business in context through immersive conversations with practitioners from across the financial industries, guided by UB professors. Students also visit investment banks and other financial institutions, and usually complete externships to sharpen their practical skills. Social events and mentorship help students develop their career skills and provide many opportunities to network with the professional community.

The Office of Student Affairs (OSA) provides a broad canopy of advising, support, engagement and resources for law students and the law school community. The OSA's goal is to form a community of belonging and support while promoting each student's academic achievement, professional development and resiliency.

Under the leadership of Professor Bernadette Gargano, vice dean for student affairs, the law school has always made caring for its students a priority. Now, the OSA has expanded, with two new assistant deans and a student life coordinator, with the goal of extending that support and making it seamless.

Academic Planning and Advising

With targeted programs and information on academic requirements, the OSA team guides students' progress through law school and is always available for individual advising.

Building a Positive and Diverse Community

Enhancing student experience outside the classroom, the OSA team works to build a positive community of belonging. For example, the Peer-to-Peer Advocate Program matches new students with upper-level students to foster structured and purposeful relationships. The law school's Office of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion, and other university partners, are important allies in building an ever more inclusive environment.

Supporting Student Organizations and Events

The CSO takes a mindful approach to career development, collaborating with legal professionals to achieve unparalleled career outcomes for our students and our employers.

Individual Career Counseling

Every student meets individually with a CSO career counselor at least once per semester and then as often as needed. Each job search is unique, and the CSO provides the highest-quality support by tailoring its services to each student.

Professional Development Programs

The CSO provides many programs to develop our students' professional identities, including lectures from experienced practitioners and new lawyers, career panels with alumni, and in-class career guidance, giving students the inside story about legal jobs across the country.

Mentor Programs

Every member of the first-year class is matched with one of more than 200 mentors who are practicing lawyers or judges, and the relationship grows throughout their law school career.



Summer Fellowship Funding

Through the vigorous fundraising of our student-run Buffalo Public Interest Law Program, as well as the support of alumni and friends, a variety of fellowships are available to law students who wish to advocate for justice in a typically unpaid summer internship.

In-House Counsel Opportunities



Why did you choose UB Law?


It's affordable. I come from a singleparent household, and UB Law is one of the few law schools in the country that is affordable. I applied to various law schools, and even with substantial scholarships, the cost was more than it costs to attend UB.

What have been some of your favorite courses?

My favorite courses so far have been Antitrust with Professor Christine Bartholomew, Intellectual Property Law with Professor Amy Semet and 20th Century American Legal History with Professor Samantha Barbas. Professor Bartholomew's Antitrust course is my favorite. I found the topic very interesting, and almost immediately I began "seeing antitrust everywhere." The thing that made this course my favorite, beyond trying to figure out how Amazon and Apple are not constantly in FTC trouble, is how much Professor Bartholomew enjoyed teaching the course. With all three of these courses, you could tell that the professors enjoyed the subject matter and loved to answer questions.

What professional opportunities have you had at UB Law?

I was a student attorney in the Civil Rights and Transparency Clinic during the 2022-23 school year, and will be returning this fall as a senior associate. Through the



clinic, I have been able to help so many and get real experience with the practice of law. I have been able to draft litigation documents, attend client meetings, and assist trans and nonbinary persons in the Buffalo area with their name and gender marker change. My work with the clinic has been very rewarding and provided a real-life experience. I can't wait to continue it this year.

What has been your best UB Law experience?

My best experience has been with the friends l've made. The experience of law school is what you make of it. My experience at UB would not have been the same without the friends and community I have made here.

Nicia arew up in Buffalo before heading to American University in Washington, D.C., where she received degrees in women's, gender and sexuality studies, and law and society, with a minor in education. Over the summer. Nicia worked as a iudicial intern in the Third Circuit Court of Appeals and as a student attorney for UB Law's Clinical Legal Education Program. During the upcoming academic year, she will be an associate editor for the Buffalo Law Review, a student attorney for the Civil Rights and Transparency Clinic, a DEI officer for OUTLaw and treasurer of the Latin American Law Students Association.

Why did you choose UB Law?

UB offers several dual degree options, and I will be able to graduate with both my JD and MSW in four years, combining my interests from both fields. Additionally, I was born and raised in Buffalo, and after leaving the state for my undergraduate education, I was excited to come back to my hometown. Law school is challenging, and having familial support was important to me.

What professional opportunities have you had at UB Law?

Even before I started classes, I attended the Diversity Career Fair, meeting with various legal employers and fellow law students. I've also attended numerous networking events throughout my first year (1L). Lastly, I was able to secure a judicial internship with Hon. Julio Fuentes in the U.S. Court of Appeals for the 3rd Circuit for my 1L summer.

What has been your best UB Law experience??

Submitting my last exam during the spring semester was a really rewarding experience, because I had just completed my 1L year and was really proud of what I had accomplished. On a silly note, on the last day of my LAWR class, my entire section surprised our LAWR professor by dressing up as him (bald cap and all).



What advice do you have for incoming law students?

Law school is hard for everyone, even if some of your classmates seem like they have it all figured out. You are all learning as you go. Go to office hours. Professors are more than happy to discuss any questions you have, and it's a great way to make connections! Don't be afraid to ask for help. Also, get into a routine early and stick to it. Time management is extremely important during law school.

What was your best learning experience from UB Law?

I learned a lot about international law. More importantly, I learned vital skills about oral and written advocacy that I now use in practice as a litigator. Arguing for Jessup in Chicago and Washington, D.C., before experienced professionals from around the world is something I will never forget.

Why did you choose UB Law?

I chose UB Law for several reasons. The first was that UB Law has a phenomenal reputation not only in New York State, but internationally as well. The second was that as a non-traditional student with a young child at home, I had the opportunity to pursue my legal career aspirations but also stay in Western New York, where I had family support to help me care for my daughter. What were the most useful skills you developed in law school?

I enjoyed the practical hands-on classes and experiences such as trial team, moot court competitions, my practicum experience with the civil courts, and my federal court externship with the late Hon. Hugh B. Scott. All of those experiences allowed me to be confident as a young litigator in the courtroom. My Legal Analysis, Writing and Research courses during my first and second years and working as a writing fellow to Dean Bernadette Gargano during my third year also equipped me with the skills I needed as a young attorney.

How have you used what you've learned in law school?


Although I am no longer a litigator, the skills I learned during law school and in my early years of practice have allowed me to have a unique viewpoint when dealing with outside counsel now as in-house counsel. I use my writing and analysis skills daily when reviewing contracts, drafting contracts or providing business departments with a legal recommendation. Additionally, the critical thinking and analytical skills I developed during law school provided me with the foundation to make sound legal determinations and to fully analyze a situation, which is something I do daily now as in-house counsel.

How have you used what you've learned in law school?

The intellectual analysis and reasoning, and persuasive advocacy (written and oral), are skills I use every day. Something even simpler, but perhaps taken for granted, is being courteous. Especially here in Buffalo, which is a tight-knit legal community where so many know each other, your reputation is most important. Opposing counsel, judges and clients will learn of your standing in the legal community.

What is the best thing about practicing law?

I enjoy the intellectual rigor and the strategy of litigation. I knew for years, even before college, that I wanted to litigate. I don't regret it for a second. Using my abilities as an attorney to help clients navigate complicated legal issues and accomplish their goals is very rewarding.
