- 2. Purchase and activate a one-year subscription to Core Grammar for Lawyers ("CGL").
 - a. Go to http://coregrammar.com/getcgl.
 - b. Complete the form. Select "New York" for the state and "University at Buffalo School of Law" in the school field.
 - c. On the payment page, enter "BUFF2019" in the Access Code field.
 - d. Enter your credit card information below, verify the purchase, and continue on to create your CGL account.
 - e. Enter "319-162-3624" in the Class Code field
 - f. You will be able to start using CGL immediately.

3. Complete the CGL Pre-Test. Do not opt out of the Pre-Test. The Pre-Test has 96 questions and typically takes about one hour to complete. Completing the Pre-Test before our first class is part of your fall semester grade. Open the Pre-Test by clicking on the home page (called your "Bookshelf"). Do not consult outside resources when you take the Pre-Test.

*Regardless of how you score on the Pre-Test, try not to be too discouraged or too confident. The primary benefit of using CGL is that, by engaging in the interactive lessons that are individually selected for you after the Pre-Test, you can advance your knowledge from whatever your starting point is. One study of the program showed that law students who engaged in the lessons experienced, on average, over 20% improvement from their Pre-Test score to their highest Post-Test score.

- 4. Write your autobiography. Your autobiography should be typed and no longer than one page, double-spaced, Century Schoolbook 12-point font. Please bring three copies of your autobiography to class with you on August 19.
- 5. There are four required books for the course. These will be the only books you need for this course for the year. You <u>may</u> purchase the first listed book before the first day of class, but it will be available to you online for free through the law library's website.

You are required to purchase the second, third, and fourth listed books before the first day of class.

While there are legitimate third-party sellers on these sites, you can only guarantee the authenticity of Bluebooks purchased through www.legalbluebook.com and retail bookstores. Do not purchase an online subscription to the Bluebook or rent it – you will need it throughout law school.
